

# MISS BRIGHAM MAKES FURNITURE FROM BOXES

She Confers With Superintendent Cassidy On the Use of Her Methods

HINDMAN ADOPTS IT

Not Yet Definitely Decided Whether It Will Be Used In Lexington

---

Miss Louise Brigham of New York City, who makes attractive furniture from empty boxes, left for Philadelphia Tuesday night after a visit of several days to Kentucky, in which she has sought to interest manual training workers in her line of endeavor. While in Lexington Miss Brigham was in consultation with Superintendent M. A. Cassidy of the city schools concerning a new course for the manual training department, the making of useful as well as ornamental furniture from ordinary wooden boxes, such as grocers and dry goods firms use in packing goods, which was originated by Miss Brigham.

Miss Brigham stopped over in the city on her way north from Hindman, Ky., where she interested the school at that place in her work. The course was introduced at that place, and will be made a part of the regular work. Miss Brigham also visited Louisville where she talked to the public school authorities.

The course itself is unique, and interesting as well, and Mr. Cassidy is much interested in the work. It has not been definitely decided whether the course shall be introduced here or not, as Miss Brigham's time here was limited and she is engaged in watching the progress of the work in many other schools.

Miss Brigham has compiled instructions concerning the construction of 100 articles in daily use about the home in a book under the title of Box Furniture.
